WOW TO WOLL

Voting is your chance to help to choose the people who run Scotland.




It is very easy to vote.

Make sure your name is on the ELECTORAL REGISTER for your area. This is a list of everyone who can vote.



The council will send you a card just before an election. This is called a POLLING CARD.

The card tells you where your POLLING STATION is and when to vote.



The people at the polling station will give you two lists of the people you can vote for. These are called BALLOT PAPERS.

If you have a POSTAL VOTE, the BALLOT PAPERS will come to your house and you post them back.
There is more information on these on the inside back page.



Go into a POLLING BOOTH and put an X by the name of the person or party you want to vote for on each BALLOT PAPER.

Fold the ballot papers and put them in the ballot box.



What will your party do about making sure that there is enough money for social care?



Conservative

We overwhelmingly support a closer integration of health and social care. Removing too many rules and getting people talking is important. Self-directed support needs a degree of flexibility in the system as well as making sure the money is spent properly and nothing goes wrong.



Labour

We think the current system is in too many bits. Rather than having separate systems for dealing with physical needs, mental health, and social care, we will create a whole person approach. A single service which will meet all of a person's health and care needs.



Liberal Democrat

We want healthcare to be good and available to people for free when they need it. We want to stop bad care happening. We are in favour of health and social care being joined up so people with long term conditions get the right help.



Green

We will protect public funding of the NHS. We want to invest health projects in the community which keep people fit and healthy. This can help tackle staff shortages elsewhere in the NHS, problems in GP practices and gaps in social care packages.









What will your party do about the welfare reforms that are affecting people with learning disabilities?



Green

We will reverse welfare cuts founded on false claims that people prefer benefits rather than rewarding work. We will end the sanctions regime. We will halt the roll-out of Universal Credit. We will help the Scottish Parliament to design a scheme that works with its social security powers.



Conservative

I support changing our welfare system to give help and encouragement to people to get back to work. I back a cap on the amount that any one family can claim in welfare. It should not be possible to claim more in benefits most people earn.



Scottish National

We will give money to protect as many people as possible from the damaging impact of the welfare reforms. This includes making up for the Bedroom Tax and the Council Tax cuts. We want full control over our benefits to allow us to make a fairer welfare system for Scotland.



Liberal Democrat

The more unequal a society is the weaker it is. Poverty and ill- health, poor housing and a lack of education make it hard for people. We will help those most disadvantaged and help each individual to achieve whatever they can.









What will your party do to make sure that support staff have decent pay and conditions?



Scottish National

We will support measures to extend the Living Wage. The Scottish Government already pays the Living Wage to all of its own employees and to those covered by its pay policy. We want to ensure that women are fairly treated at work and get equal pay and greater support for time off for mum and dad when they have a baby.



Labour

We know that one in five care workers will leave their job each year. We will make caring a career that more will choose for the long term by putting more money in to the pockets of low paid workers and local economies. Scottish Labour will guarantee a real Living Wage for care workers.



Green

We will increase the Minimum Wage to the Living Wage, because nobody should be expected to work for a wage that keeps them in poverty. We will help ensure women are paid the same as men by raising the minimum wage, requiring businesses to publish pay data and improve flexible working rights.



Conservative

We have a plan for the next five years to move us to a higher wage, lower tax, lower welfare country. Workers aged over 25 will be entitled to a "national living wage" from this April of £7.20 and that will rise to £9 an hour by 2020.





What will your party do to make sure people are safe from bullying in the community?



Liberal Democrat

We believe everybody should be treated the same whatever their background or circumstances. We will make sure people can say what they think. We will stop the police being rough and stop discrimination and bullying.



Green

A few years ago the Scottish Parliament passed a Green bill enacting laws to tackle hate crimes against gay and disabled people. We think that courts should be required to take into account why someone did something because sentences will be more effective if they try to challenge hate crime.



Labour

There is a worrying increase in the number of people reporting disability related hate crime. Labour will never tolerate discrimination, scapegoating or abuse of disabled people. We will find new ways of stamping out disability hate crime, sending a clear message that abuse of disabled people must be stamped out.



Scottish National

Any attack or discrimination based on the assumption of someone's religion, race or disability is completely unacceptable. We are concerned about the rise in attacks directed towards those with disabilities. Scotland is a country which does not tolerate biased views and we will take firm action taken against what appears to be increased reporting of crimes against people on the basis of disability.





What will your party do to protect and improve health services?



Labour

Now more than ever we need a health service free at the point of use based on patient need, not the ability to pay. Our NHS is our most valued public service and we need a long term vision for our NHS, one that invests in social care to ease pressure on our hospitals and gives more vulnerable scots the dignity of care in their own home.



Liberal Democrat

Good health is one of the most important things we can have in life, and we must do all we can to help people stay healthy and provide high quality care when they are ill. Health inequalities are a national disgrace and the Liberal Democrats will strive to ensure that Scotland has a robust NHS for generations to come.



Scottish National

The SNP believe the NHS should remain a publicly funded, publicly-delivered service. We will not follow the privatisation agenda of the Westminster government. We will ensure that the frontline resource budget of the NHS will continue to rise in real terms in the next parliament if we are re-elected.



We will stick to our commitment to a universal and comprehensive health service, free at the point of use. By the end of 2020, we should see an additional £800 million annually for the health service in Scotland. So you will always have access to a free and high quality health service when you need it most.

The first ballot paper is for your town or local area.

There will be the names of the people standing and the names of the parties they are standing for.

Whoever gets the most votes will be elected.

There are 73 MSPs elected this way. They will be the main people who speak up for you in the Scottish Parliament.

This ballot paper is usually on PINK paper.

The second ballot paper is for the region of the country you live in. There will only be the names of the parties or the names of independents standing.

Counting these votes is complicated. This vote is meant to help smaller parties get elected.

There are 56 MSPs elected this way, 7 for each region. They can also help speak up for you in the Parliament.

This ballot paper is usually on ORANGE paper.
